SUBJECT DESCRIPTION

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SKILLS

Basic Skills

Students must have demonstrated knowledge and understanding in an area of study that is founded on general secondary education. Moreover, the area of study is typically at a level that includes certain aspects implying knowledge at the forefront of its field of study, albeit supported by advanced textbooks

Students must be able to apply their knowledge to their work or vocation in a professional manner and possess skills that can typically be demonstrated by coming up with and sustaining arguments and solving problems within their field of study

Students must have the ability to gather and interpret relevant data (usually within their field of study) in order to make judgments that include reflections on pertinent social, scientific or ethical issues

Students must be able to convey information, ideas, problems and solutions to both an expert and non-expert audience

Students must have developed the learning skills needed to undertake further study with a high degree of independence

General Skills

To acquire an ability for analysis, synthesis, assessment and critical reasoning.

To apply theoretical knowledge acquired for solving problems in crime-related contexts.

Specific skills

To identify the foundations of public law as well as the structure of the State and its main institutions in order to suitably manage its conceptual foundations in the professional practice of the criminologist.

To identify the structure of the Administration of Justice in the criminal field and the legal mechanisms in order to suitably implement and use them in the professional practice of the criminologist.

To be familiar with the fundamental rights and guarantees of all citizens and, in particular, the rights and guarantees recognised for each and every individual involved in a criminal procedure in order to correctly use them in the professional practice of the criminologist.
