SUBJECT DESCRIPTION

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SKILLS

Basic Skills

Students must have demonstrated knowledge and understanding in an area of study that is founded on general secondary education. Moreover, the area of study is typically at a level that includes certain aspects implying knowledge at the forefront of its field of study, albeit supported by advanced textbooks

Students must be able to apply their knowledge to their work or vocation in a professional manner and possess skills that can typically be demonstrated by coming up with and sustaining arguments and solving problems within their field of study

Students must have the ability to gather and interpret relevant data (usually within their field of study) in order to make judgments that include reflections on pertinent social, scientific or ethical issues

Students must be able to convey information, ideas, problems and solutions to both an expert and non-expert audience

Students must have developed the learning skills needed to undertake further study with a high degree of independence

General Skills

To analyse crime, the victim and the social and legal response to the phenomenon of crime from the standpoint of the various local, national and international contexts.

Specific skills

To be familiar with the social dimension of humankind: socialisation process and family, school, socio-cultural and historical influences; the dynamics of human groups and collectives; and fundamental social institutions from the standpoint of social inequality and cultural difference.

To use and interpret social indicators and social measurement instruments, combining different designs in research, data compilation, preparation as well as the comparison of hypotheses and interpretation of results.

To analyse the transformations and development of modern societies and their political and social movements.

To be familiar with and assess the statistical relationships between specific psychiatric nosologies and certain forms of crime.
