SUBJECT DESCRIPTION

Cuando hablamos de vocación, nos referimos de manera explícita a la vocación primera, es decir a la propia como personas y su potencialidad de desarrollo en todas sus dimensiones. La vocación profesional es un derivado de esta vocación personal.

De este modo, la materia de Antropología Fundamental aborda la reflexión del hombre en cuanto tal, ayudando al alumno a preguntarse "qué" y "quién" es el hombre, y en especial «quien es él y cuál es el sentido de su vida».

Pretende que el alumno conozca la realidad de su tiempo a partir de la génesis y el desarrollo de las ideas, valores y creencias que la han configurado, descubra el fundamento de la dignidad humana y el valor de su ser social, se reconozca como ser de encuentro bio-psico-socio-espiritual y que toda esta reflexión la pueda trasladar

a su plano personal y le ayude a desarrollarse y vivir en plenitud.

Esta asignatura es uno de los pilares del objeto del Grado en Relaciones Internacionales, pues pone parte importante de las bases para formarse como hombres comprometidos capaces de tender puentes y favorecer la comprensión entre países, organismos e instituciones y aportar valor en la transformación de nuestro mundo y en la construcción de la paz.
