SUBJECT DESCRIPTION

<p>La asignatura Derecho del Trabajo, troncal y obligatoria, se enmarca en el módulo de Derecho Privado. Estudia los derechos y obligaciones que nacen para las partes en la relación jurídico laboral, tanto individual como colectiva, así como las instituciones que operan en el sistema laboral español.</p> <p>Si todo el Derecho es una ciencia social, el Derecho del trabajo constituye la especialidad jurídica social por antonomasia, por cuanto se funda sobre la realidad del trabajo humano en libertad, inseparable de la persona en su relación con los demás.</p>

El alumno debe comprender las conexiones históricas, antropológicas y éticas de esta disciplina jurídica, de forma que entienda el Derecho del trabajo no sólo como un mero conjunto de normas positivas - cuya técnica, sin duda, ha de dominar-, sino también como un ordenamiento armónico que se orienta a un fin y que descansa en una determinada concepción de la persona y de su ser en la sociedad.

La desigualdad originaria entre la empresa y el trabajador, la progresiva intervención del legislador y de las autoridades administrativas para crear y hacer cumplir las normas laborales, la representación sindical de los trabajadores y el impulso de la negociación colectiva, la existencia de un orden jurisdiccional específico, la libertad de empresa con el poder de dirección del empresario y el respeto a los derechos fundamentales, integran un sistema jurídico laboral en constante evolución que debe conocerse a fondo en sus aspectos teóricos y prácticos para aplicar el Derecho del trabajo como una inversión social capaz de integrar a quienes piensan distinto.
