SUBJECT DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this course is to study the functioning and structure of international society. This requires an introduction to International Relations and its main theories and an analysis of the evolution of today's international society. The main international actors are studied: the State (with an analysis of foreign policy), international organizations (delving into the United Nations Organization, regional organizations and international economic organizations) and other actors in international relations. The interactions between these international actors are also studied.

GOAL

The objective of this course is for students to understand the importance of interaction between different international actors in the definition of politics and regulations at the domestic level.

PRIOR KNOWLEDGE

To properly assimilate this subject, it is recommended to have successfully studied "Public International Law", in the second year.

It is recommended to be able to read in English, as almost all up-to-date information is available in English.

SKILLS

Basic Skills

Students must have demonstrated knowledge and understanding in an area of study that is founded on general secondary education. LEARNING APPRAISAL SYSTEM

A system of continuous evaluation is proposed, with different strategies and evaluation tests, aimed at observing the achievement of the proposed learning results.

In the ORDINARY CALL, a system of continuous evaluation is proposed. The weighting of the different tests in the final evaluation will be as follows:

Evaluation test Percentage in the final grade

Works (research, press analysis, etc.) 30%

Participation (in class, in tutoring, debates, chats...) 20%

Final Exam 50%

ALTERNATIVE EVALUATION SYSTEM: those students who have an exemption from attendance, with prior authorization from the race, to be evaluated must:

- Submit the work assigned for this purpose before a date to be specified by the teacher: (30% of the final grade).
- Take the June official call exam (70% of the final grade).

The same system will apply to STUDENTS WHO APPLY FOR SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT CALLS (repeat students) as long as they do not follow the continuous evaluation system.

In the EXTRAORDINARY CALL, in addition to the written exam, the submission of case studies or comments will be required, with the deadline for submission being the day of the official exam. The grade of the subject would be calculated as follows: exam (70%), papers (30%).

Evaluation Criteria

- A minimum of 5/10 is required in the final exam for this grade to average with the rest of those obtained during the course
- Each evaluation test will indicate the penalty involved in delivering it after the deadline, when this is allowed.
- Spelling errors penalize the result of the test in which they are found: one point less for lack or for three points of accentuation.
- If plagiarism is detected in any work or evaluation test, the grade of the subject will be suspended, regardless of the average that results from the rest of the works or tests carried out.

ETHICAL AND RESPONSIBLE USE OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

1.- The use of any Artificial Intelligence (AI) system or service shall be determined by the lecturer, and may only be used in the manner and under the conditions indicated by them. In all cases, its use must comply with the following principles:

- a) The use of AI systems or services must be accompanied by critical reflection on the part of the student regarding their impact and/or limitations in the development of the assigned task or project.
- b) The selection of AI systems or services must be justified, explaining their advantages over other tools or methods of obtaining information. The chosen model and the version of AI used must be described in as much detail as possible.
- c) The student must appropriately cite the use of AI systems or services, specifying the parts of the work where they were used and describing the creative process followed. The use of citation formats and usage examples may be consulted on the Library website(https://www.ufv.es/gestion-de-la-informacion_biblioteca/).
- d) The results obtained through AI systems or services must always be verified. As the author, the student is responsible for their work and for the legitimacy of the sources used.
- 2.- In all cases, the use of AI systems or services must always respect the principles of responsible and ethical use upheld by the university, as outlined in the <u>Guide for the Responsible Use of Artificial Intelligence in Studies at UFV</u>. Additionally, the lecturer may request other types of individual commitments from the student when deemed necessary.
- 3.- Without prejudice to the above, in cases of doubt regarding the ethical and responsible use of any AI system or service, the lecturer may require an oral presentation of any assignment or partial submission. This oral evaluation shall take precedence over any other form of assessment outlined in the Teaching Guide. In this oral defense, the student must demonstrate knowledge of the subject, justify their decisions, and explain the development of their work.
